THINGS TO DO AND SEE



Royal Parks

London is known for its 8 Royal Parks, which are all centrally located throughout the city and offer a delightful retreat from the hustle and bustle of the city. Hyde Park and Kensington Gardens are side-by-side. Kensington Palace is on the west end of Kensington Gardens. Regent's Park contains the largest collection of roses in London.

The British Museum

Dedicated to history, art and culture, this museum has one of the largest and most comprehensive permanent collections in the world. (7 min. walk from Holborn Station)

Big Ben and the House of Parliament

Two of the city's most iconic landmarks. (3 min. walk from Westminster Station)

St. Paul's Cathedral

With its unmistakable dome, St. Paul's cathedral has remained a symbol of National Identity since its completion in 1708. (6 min. walk from Mansion House Station)

Buckingham Palace

No trip to London is complete without a visit to Buckingham Palace, the official residence of the British Monarchy. (*10 min. walk from Green Park Station*)

Covent Garden

A popular shopping destination, nestled among elegant buildings, theatres and the Royal Opera House. This is a fun destination at the heart of London's cultural center. (*2 min. walk from Covent Garden Station*)

Tipping

Tipping is appreciated in London but is not always expected. Tipping taxi drivers and at restaurants is appropriate (10-15% is customary). However tipping in bars, pubs and hotels is not generally expected. Tour guides are an exception to this; most guides will appreciate or expect a tip.

Electric Current


Plugs in England look like this, so you will need an adapter. Voltage is 220-240, whereas in the U.S. and Canada it is 110, so you will also need a converter. However, most chargers these days have a box which will act as a converter. If your charger says "Input: 100-240V, 50/60 Hz" then you do not need to use a converter.

TRANSPORTATION



London has a very comprehensive public transportation system. The three best methods of getting around the city are the Underground (Tube), bus and taxi. You can buy a visitor Oyster Card at most tube stations, as well as at newsagents and small shops across London. The Oyster Card allows you to move throughout the city by tube and bus with ease, as well as saving you money compared to buying individual paper tickets.
